English

- English 10 all students take English 10
- English 11- all students take First People's English 11 -this satisfies the Indigenous course graduation requirement introduced in 2024.
- ► English 12- Choose between; English Studies 12, AP English or English First People's 12(taken in Contemporary Indigenous Studies)

-all meet University entrance requirements

English AP

AP classes are based on First-year university courses. Students who successfully complete these will receive credit for the Grade 12 equivalent and the AP course (8 credits total)

Student will have the opportunity to write the standardized AP exam and if a high enough score is obtained may* get a first-year credit at the College or University they attend.

*assignment of credit is at the discretion of the college or university and not guaranteed

Humanities

Students have the opportunity to take a Linear English and Social Studies class if they choose. Runs all year, one block per semester





INDIGENOUS VISUAL ARTS 10/11/12

The goal of this course is to honour and celebrate the Indigenous community through visual art and provide an opportunity for any student to learn and experience these visual art forms.

- Connection to Place: Land based learning and multiple field studies across the Okanagan
- Learning alongside syilx Elders and Knowledge Keepers
- Learn a diverse set of skills including creating ecodyes, using medicines to create natural products, weaving, printmaking, beading, painting, and more.
- Use a variety of mediums to create art, such as: natural materials, felt, wool, beads, plants, paints, wire, clay, and more.







"AP Passion to Action" is a dynamic Grade 12 course which invites students to explore their passions and curiosities through land-based, inquiry-driven learning, while focusing on making a meaningful impact for themselves, for their community, and/or for the land. Students will co-design their learning experiences, allowing them to engage deeply with topics they care about, while gaining hands-on experience that connects them with the land and the community around them.

Throughout the course, students will explore key issues related to environmental sustainability, social justice, and community well-being. They will be encouraged to develop actionable ideas and solutions, working closely with Indigenous Elders and Knowledge Keepers, mentors, experts, and community leaders who will help them bring their vision to life. Students will also learn how to apply for micro-grants which can support them with their 'Do Good Projects.' Whether addressing local environmental challenges, advocating for social equity, or shaping their own career pathways, students will learn how to create positive change in the world.

By the end of the course, students will have developed a **strong sense of their role** in addressing global and local challenges, while also **gaining skills** in critical thinking, project management, and community collaboration. They will leave with a **sense of accomplishment**, having made meaningful contributions to their community and the land, while also **gaining clarity about their own futures** and how they can **make** a **lasting difference** in their communities and beyond.
