

École George Elliot Secondary PAC: Principal's Report

- Monday, November 17, 2025



- **Thank you!**
 - Thanks from all of us for being involved in PAC, our school, and in your child's education. We are very appreciative of parents/guardians who volunteer and make a difference.
- **Calendar Drafts (26/27 & 27/28)**
 - In accordance with district policy, I need to run the draft calendars by the PAC prior to moving toward finalizing. Each year, the district calendar committee sends in most of the days, and as a school we include the early dismissal dates. We have three each year.
 - Please look at the schedules (back of this report) for the coming two years and provide me with any feedback you feel would help our scheduling.
- **Score Clocks**
 - The district is looking toward long-term planning for facilities, and one item that has come up refers to score clocks in high-school gymnasiums
 - High school gyms have been having issues as these clocks are aging out – ours are original to our reno in 1997, and I spent a couple thousand a couple years ago in maintenance to keep them going. RSS's are completely shot, MBSS's are older than ours and don't work anymore. KSS has been searching for replacements etc. for over a year now as theirs are on their last legs.
 - The district is sourcing new clocks working alongside ADs and want us all to get ours upgraded and up to a common standard in the next year or two (same models, etc.). The district is covering a bunch of the cost.
 - Here's the challenge – the school's share to pay will be roughly \$40,000 to upgrade the main gym. This does not include what the district is covering. It would usually take me 3-4 years to save that amount and still operate the school with a little wiggle room. I am curious if the PAC wants to organize and run a fundraiser (next year?) to help offset this bill to the school operating.
 - I know that's not where high school PACs usually spend their time, but this is a very large cost, and I am looking for your help. There's no urgency that this has to be done now, but I was hoping to float the idea your way and put it on your radar.
- **Student Learning Council and Student Scan**
 - We have engaged in a scan of our students to find out about their experience at GESS. The questions developed were:

- Question 1: Do you feel welcomed, valued, and like your voice is heard at George Elliot? What might help you feel a stronger sense of belonging, inclusion, and support here?
 - Question 2: What aspects of your learning are most important to you and why? In what ways does George Elliot create opportunities for you to pursue your curiosity and build important skills?
 - Question 3: How does George Elliot support you in making an impact that matters for your own growth, for those around you, and for the world at large?
 - Question 4: What would help you feel more confident in reaching your goals both in school and in life beyond it? What does success look like to you, and how do you see yourself making a difference in the things that matter most?
- In patterning the data using AI asking about their learning and their experience, some common themes arise (the shortened, generalized version of the results):
 - 1. Relationships and Belonging Are Key
 - Students thrive when they feel welcomed, valued, and connected. Positive relationships with teachers and peers create a sense of safety and belonging, which is essential for learning. When students know adults care about them and their voices matter, they feel supported and confident.
 - 2. Learning That Feels Relevant and Engaging
 - Students want their education to connect to real life and future goals. They value hands-on experiences, creative projects, and opportunities to explore personal interests. Practical skills help them see the purpose behind what they learn.
 - 3. Inclusion and Respect for Every Student
 - Students appreciate environments where everyone feels included and respected, regardless of grade level, program, or background. They want their voices heard and their individuality recognized. A school culture that celebrates diversity and equity helps all students feel they belong.
- Students were also asked if they wanted to be part of a Student Learning Council as the fifth question. We had 35 students say they'd be interested in coming alongside the teachers in their work, giving feedback, providing support, etc.
 - Hoping our first meeting with the students will be next week.
