VP Update

• Public Health Nurses – Wellness Clinics in High Schools

- As part of a provincial mandate, we will be hosting public health nurses for a half-day every second day until the end of the year. Our days will be Wednesday mornings starting in mid-February.
- O The letter we will be sending home is as follows from Interior Health:

Subject: Public Health Nurse Wellness Clinics in School Settings for Grade 10, 11, 12 Students

As part of Interior Health (IH) - Central Okanagan's efforts to provide access to public health nursing (PHN) support and services, IH will be offering in-school PHN Wellness Clinics for grade 10, 11, & 12 students between now and the end of this school year.

During the Wellness Clinic in the school, Public Health Nurses will be available to talk with students and answer any questions about public health nursing services, such as health and wellness promotion/disease prevention information, and resources. This is also a great opportunity for senior high school students to meet with a public health nurse to assess their immunization history and ensure they have all the necessary vaccinations before they graduate. Some post-secondary schools/training programs require immunization history prior to

starting the program. Additionally, based on information gleaned from the recent 2023 McCreary Adolescent Survey indicating a growing concern from students regarding a variety of health-related topics, these in-school clinics will offer improved access for students to reach out to a health professional.

COVID-19 or Influenza vaccines will not be offered or provided at these Wellness Clinics.

- O Times will be drop in only for the time being and they will be located in our conference room. Students will need to check in with the secretaries with a "I'm here to see the nurses" with no further info needed, and as soon as they're free, they will see whatever student who comes by.
- O They've offered to do some info notice boards and stuff, and we'll see where it goes

Dual Credit Application Process

- Just a reminder:
 - For dual credit programs (essentially, go to school at a post-secondary facility and receive high school credit at the same time), they are starting to accept applications for the 25-26 schools year. Most programs are for Grade 12s, but there are some at Grade 11, and only one or two at Grade 10.
 - Programs accept/close applications at slightly different times
- If students have questions, they should see Tim Frechette or Louise Boisvert in the Careers Centre – in semester 2, Careers coordinators will be visiting classes, but if your children are interested, inquiring early doesn't hurt.
